Grafted Pears and Descriptions

Old Faithful (Gallaway)- (Oct/Dec)

Apple/ Pear is how I would describe it. Late-season fruit that lasts on the ground well into December. Consistent producer and deer magnet. Fruit is tough but softens when it falls to the ground, and deer will eat it up—Round and firm like an apple, with the texture like one. Additionally, it makes a great cooking or canning pear.

Hardy Deer Pear (Wildlife) - (Nov-Dec)

My Old buddy Jim Hardy, with Outdoor Friends Forever, loves this little deer banger. When nothing else is left, the Hardy Pear will still bring them in. Consistent and early producer, guaranteed year after year. This is not a treat for you, but the Deer Love it. Golf ball-sized fruit, and the trees are huge producers. This tree was found on an old fence line near McMinnville, TN.

Horse Pear(Laneene) – (Oct/Dec)

Found this tree in Downs, AL. Always looking for new and different trees. While driving on a day in early December, I saw a group of horses under a tree in the middle of an old pasture. Stopped, pulled out my binoculars, and discovered it was a giant old pear tree. Consistent producer that I have seen holding pears into December. I really like this old tree! A great addition to your fruit orchard for canning and attracting wildlife.

Grafted Apples and Descriptions

Royal Limbertwig (Sept/Oct) zones 5-9

Early 1800s cider apple. The first trees were discovered in the southern Appalachian Mountain ranges. This apple is cold-hardy but likes slightly warmer climates to reach peak ripeness. I have found it to be a great producer and disease-resistant in my orchards. The deer love them. The apple has a herbal spicy flavor. Mix with crabapples to aid in pollination.

orchard for fresh snacking and early-season draw for the big buck cruising through the orchard. Planting mixed crops with overlapping drop dates keeps the deer on your property.

Grafted Crabapples and Descriptions

Dolgo Crabapple (Sept/Oct) Zones 4-9

Dolgo crabapple, why do we grow them? Cause everyone should have one or ten. These are small 1"-1 ½" sized fruits that are just an all-around great tree. They pollinate apples, are great to eat, make jams and jellies, and, most importantly, deer love them. This is a can-not-miss fruit tree for your property.
